

Maths Resources - SumDog (adolescents), MyMaths (primary), Maths Books, Puzzles	£127.34	All	Products for pupils who have struggled with learning maths. Average incremental percentage increase in maths scores (WRAT1 to WRAT2) by pupil admission across all age groups 1.40.
Books - Reading Resources Renewal	£1,463.05	All	Many of our disadvantaged pupils may not have ready access to a wide range of reading materials and we are always updating our collection with quality non-fiction and fiction titles to promote reading for pleasure. All disadvantaged pupils are now encouraged to read each week each Thursday morning. Analysis of performance in WRAT 4 Word Reading assessment shows that progress for disadvantaged pupils is 9 times higher for disadvantaged pupils compared to those not disadvantaged.
Newspapers and Magazines, including First News	£379.78	All	Encouraging range of reading activities and knowledge of current affairs. First News provides weekly, topical content to enhance skimming, scanning and reading for meaning skills in English lesson starters. 8 copies with online resources have been received since 2016. With the group of children from 2018-19 there was progress in reading and spelling as demonstrated by the following case studies. Case Study 1. Pupil O was a reluctant reader initially but gradually he was able to engage in topical discussions based on newspaper articles. O's rate of change in reading as measured by the WRAT was 1.54 Case Study 2. R responded to the range of topical articles, games and information. She engaged in some lessons and her reading increased 0.09 as measured by the WRAT. WRAT word reading analysis shows a percentage increase from WRAT1 to WRAT2 of 1.89% for disadvantaged pupils by pupil admission.
Pupil Specific Resources including:	£1,319.45	All	Many of our disadvantaged pupils are helped by receiving resources targeting specific areas of need to help them make progress in their learning. For example: In the primary department, using 'Sonic Figures' as a rewarding activity following the completion of school work a pupil's motivation improved, being able to work for up to 10 minutes on some maths and English tasks. Previously they were wandering during most lessons which had a negative impact on their ability to access education. For example: In the adolescent department, attendance prizes support our students to gain a sense of achievement and also to provide a visible acknowledgement of their achievement. This particularly meets the needs of those students who historically have had poor experiences at school and for whom this may be one of the first school prizes they have received. Case Study 1 - Student Y who was encouraged to return to education after a prolonged period of absence, and has remained engaged in education (current attendance 65% increased by 12%). As a direct consequence of this improved attendance this student will shortly be sitting functional skills exams in Maths and English (Level 1). Case Study 2 - Student J had some trainers purchased for them as they had lost confidence in attending school and sports due to ill-fitting clothing and shoes. This student has since demonstrated improvement via summative assessment across maths, spelling and reading (see graph).  Case Study 3 - Gym sessions x 4 - Student J enjoys sports and finds this a positive way to help to manage themselves and calm down prior to starting school in the mornings. This student has passed functional skills Level 1 English since being with us and is preparing to sit Level 2 functional skills. We have also purchased two short courses on Food Hygiene which they have completed and passed which supports career aims of moving into catering. We find the best times to sit these exams is directly after a sport session when most focussed.
Attendance Prizes	£249.72	All	Attendance prizes to encourage and reward consistent attendance, with its associated benefits, at school. In Secondary/Post 16 department this has supported a 14% increase in attendance during on term.

Base line and follow up assessments linked with the attendance register through the database have allowed: the setting of individualised Maths and English targets on admission; the precise analysis of progress against these targets on follow up per the daily rate of attendance for each pupil.
